- 2. Problem 17-2 (Making Binary Search Dynamic)
- 3. Problem 22-4 (Reachability) <sup>1</sup>
- 4. Professor Curly conjectures that if we do union by rank, without path compression, the amortized cost of all operations is  $o(\log n)$ . Prove him wrong by showing that if we do union by rank without path compression, there can be m MAKESET, UNION and FINDSET operations, n of which are MAKESET operations, where the total cost of all operations is  $\theta(m \log n)$ .
- 5. Assume you are given a connected graph G. Give an algorithm that returns a vertex v in G, such that if v is removed, G is still connected. Motivation: G might represent a social network at a company and you want to choose some unlucky person to fire whose removal will not disconnect the company network.
- 6. Professor Moe conjectures that for any graph G, the set of edges {(u,v) : there exists a cut (S,V-S) such that (u,v) is a light edge crossing (S, V-S)} always forms a minimum spanning tree. Given a simple example of a connected graph that proves him wrong.
- 7. Exercise 23.1-2 ("Professor Sabatier conjectures")
- 8. Exercise 23.1-3 ("Show that if an edge (u,v) is contained in some minimum spanning tree")
- 9. Exercise 22.2-7 ("There are two types of professional wrestlers")
